Thoughts from the Executive Director

This February marks an anniversary of sorts for the Claudia House Shelter; during the past year Survivors, Inc. has begun the essential work of repairing the Claudia House Shelter, an older building that needed a lot of work and care to continue its job of providing respite to those who are fleeing abuse and seeking a violence free life. We have worked to ensure that Claudia House is a warm, embracing, empowering place for our shelter guests to reside. Through the generosity of many individuals, businesses, organizations and foundations, not to mention the Borough of Gettysburg and the Adams County Commissioners, we have been able to achieve many essential repairs, including:

- * Replaced faulty wiring and upgraded electricity capacity within the shelter
- * Replaced a hot water tank that was venting into the basement due to a collapsed chimney
- * Extensively repaired the children's playroom- repaired and replaced sheet rock, ceiling tiles, and flooring (not to mention the furnishings and toys) that were contaminated by mildew due to a leaky basement
- * Repaired cracks in the foundation that precipitated the mildew issue
- * Weatherized the house through South Central Community Action Program
- * Took down trees that were threatening the house and its sewage lines
- * Replaced the fence that was in process of falling down
- * Replaced the failed security system
- * Tore down a garage that was damaged by water leakage and a serious infestation of carpenter bees
- * Replaced a bathtub and repaired faulty plumbing
- * Established a dedicated outside play area for the children residing at the shelter
- * Replaced windows of the shelter
- * Removed a porch that was dangerously water damaged and rotted
- * Graded and landscaped to ensure water drains away from the foundation
- * Installed a remote rear access gate to allow clients safe and private access
- * Installed handrails and tore up/re-poured existing sidewalks to eliminate trip hazards
- * Repaired the stoop on the side entrance
- * Replaced the front porch roof and steps
- * Replaced carpeting on the stairs and hallways
- * Replaced vinyl flooring
- * Pulled up old carpeting to expose hardwood floors
- * Replaced aging exterior doors
- * Filled in broken basement windows with brick
- * Installed a dishwasher for shelter guests
- * Added high speed internet access for shelter guests

Battlefield Harley will be holding their first annual Nearly New Stuff Sale in the Pavilion to benefit Survivors, Inc. On Sunday the sale will open at 10 a.m. and end at 4 p.m. All unsold items will be donated to the Gettysburg Hospital Thrift Shop or the Adams County Rescue Mission.

You can help by bringing your nearly new or gently worn clothing to the dealership anytime from March 17th through April 9th. Only items that are clean and in good condition will be accepted. All items should be folded or placed on wire hangers. You will receive a donation receipt for the items that you drop off. The items will then be priced and sorted by size.

Legislative Corner

As has been noted in previous newsletters, the budget outlook for the next year is grim. Listed below are the proposed cuts at both the Federal and State levels- which will impact those who access services locally.

SASP

By the time this newsletter reaches you in your homes the fate of SASP will be decided so to speak- the deadline for support was March 14, 2008. As you may be aware the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) was reauthorized and signed into law by President Bush on January 5, 2006. VAWA 2005 reauthorized lifesaving programs that have been at the core of our community's response to domestic and sexual violence for over a decade. (*More on VAWA and proposed cuts in 2009 below.*) It also expanded these programs to include victims of sexual assault by authorizing the Sexual Assault Service Program (SASP) which creates a desperately needed federal funding stream for direct services, which will assure rape crisis centers have the necessary funds to continue providing vital services to all victims of sexual violence.

The Sexual Assault Services Program not only provides funds for service providers, but it also makes available resources to state, territory and tribal sexual assault coalitions who work to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of local programs. At the time the newsletter went to print only 12 members of the House of Representatives had signed the 'Dear Colleague Letter' in support. Last year there were over 100.

State COLA for Sexual Assault Providers

Advocates and supporters are requesting a 3% cost of living adjustment for rape crisis center programs to the Governor's budget by adding additional increase of \$185,310 to the state line item. Funding for rape crisis centers is "level" funded for next fiscal year- which in reality is a significant cut.

Governor Proposes Flat Funding for Domestic Violence Providers

Domestic Violence and Stalking Programs will be similarly impacted by the Governor's 'level' funding.

The President's 2009 Federal Budget

The President released his \$3 trillion FY 2009 budget on February 4th to Congress which freezes domestic discretionary spending for the next five years. Overall, 61 percent of spending in fiscal 2009 under Bush's proposed budget would be for mandatory programs such as Social Security, Medicare and interest on the national debt, with annual spending for discretionary programs making up the remaining 39 percent. Overall the President's budget eliminates 151 programs (savings of \$18 billion) across all federal agencies and sets spending limits that will balance the budget by 2012.

As expected, domestic priorities such as health care, education and victim related services were all slashed, while the Defense Department would receive a large increase. This increase does not even include additional spending for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan which the President says he will need in FY 2008 and the Congress will have to appropriate through supplemental appropriations measures. What this means is delineated below:

VAWA Programs

Overall, the President's budget proposes devastating cuts to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, stalking, and dating violence. Specifically the budget includes a **cut to OVW programs by \$120 million, from \$400M to \$280M** — and would **turn it into one block grant program**.

VOCA Fund

The President maintains the VOCA cap (\$590 million) and once again calls for the elimination of the VOCA fund. Last year because of your calls and the efforts of our allies, the VOCA fund was saved from complete elimination in FY 2008. However, despite the best efforts of our champions in Congress, we were not ultimately able to raise the VOCA cap and the overall fund did sustain a cut of \$35 million as part of a 6% cut to all Department of Justice programs. Already NAESV and its allies are joining together to support Rep. Ted Poe's (R-TX) efforts to raise the VOCA cap to \$770 million in FY 2009.

Rape Prevention Education (RPE)

The President's budget proposes to cut **RPE to \$41.838 million which is a decrease of \$178,000 from the FY 2008 funding level**. Overall HHS VAWA funding is \$172.3 million.

What this all means for those impacted by sexual assault and domestic violence in Adams County- 2008 has been a year of significant cuts, many occurring after the fiscal year has begun. To use an over-used analogy- the funding cuts are likened to 'being pecked to death by ducks' with staff being asked to do more with less and less.

What survivors of rape and battering desperately need is YOU- and your voice! Please contact Survivors, Inc. if you would like to be informed of the specific impact these cuts are having in our area. We would be happy to educate you, so you in turn can educate your elected representatives of the impact on our community and of your wishes as their constituency.

- * Replacing the dilapidated kitchen with brand new cabinets, countertops, and flooring
- * Installing an over the range microwave
- * Pouring gravel in parking areas and reseeding the lot
- * Planting flowers and creating a Peace Garden to honor those who have lost their lives to domestic violence
- * Moving the washer and dryer upstairs
- * Painting the exterior of the house
- * Replacing rear and side doors and frames
- * Repair of interior plaster and replacing paneling with sheetrock
- * Painting the entire interior of the house

Once again, we cannot say thank you enough to all who helped us complete this significant work. As is true with any worthy endeavor- Claudia House is a work in progress, and we have some additional work to complete in the next year. This work includes:

- * Replacing bathroom fixtures that are broken and aging (many are over 50 years old and have had hard use by multiple families)
- * Installing central air which will benefit the ladies and families who access shelter on several levels- they will be more comfortable and it will eliminate the need to have window units/open windows/fans that can be a safety issue, and will allow Survivors, Inc. to manage utility costs in a more efficient manner. Conserving energy and keeping utility costs low benefits all areas of services. A final benefit will be eliminating the potential damage the window A/C units could wreak on the newly installed replacement windows.

A year ago the list of essential repairs was long and frankly, a bit daunting. A year later Claudia House radiates the support and generosity of the Adams County community, and that support is felt *every day* by those seeking sanctuary from abuse. Once again, we thank you for your support. Together we can make a difference ...

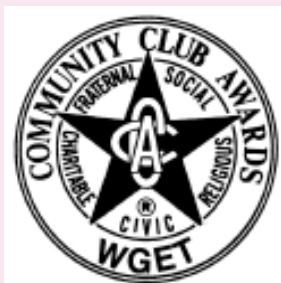
